1. Article: Assessing the Carer Support Needs Assessment Tool for use with parents of children with life-limiting conditions

The Carer Support Needs Assessment Tool (CSNAT) is a well-established evidence based tool assessing the carer support needs of adults supporting adults. In this research 30 mothers and 12 fathers (recruited from 4 children's hospice services) took part in assessing the suitability of an adapted paediatric version with positive results.

2. Article - Home enteral tube feeding: trouble shooting

This article looks at common complications that can occur with home enteral tube feeding and suggestions to manage them. These include: gastrointestinal changes – reflux, nausea, diarrhoea and bloating, tube blockage, stoma site problems, plus more. A good article for being familiar with common complications that can occur for either adults or children.

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3. Article: What the new Paediatric Early Warning Score (PEWS) means for nurses

An overview of the new Paediatric Early Warning Score, launched in November 2023 currently being rolled out in NHS Trusts across England. Produced by the RCN and Royal College of

Paediatrics and Child Health to improve the detection of deterioration in children on general children's inpatient wards. Children's hospices are not required to use this tool but it may be useful to compare to tools currently being used. <u>4 tools</u> have been designed for use with different ages.

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4. Medicine Leaflets for Parents: Drugs to reduce saliva production

From the excellent website Medicines for Children, two new leaflets for parents on Glycopyrronium and



hyoscine hydrobromide, drugs used to reduce saliva production. A useful resource for new staff not familiar with the drugs or side effects.

5. Article: Adapting a tissue viability education programme to online learning.

A tissue viability team redeveloped its staff education course to be delivered online during the Covid-19 pandemic. This resulted in permanent changes to the way it delivered pressure ulcer prevention and wound care education. It included changes to the programme itself with 3 levels – foundation to expert, and involvement of AHPs. The result was a blended model of learning that provided more flexibility, accessibility and increased knowledge of staff.

8. Article – Exploring the experience of fathers who have a child with a learning disability

Most research on the experiences of families with children with complex needs captures the experiences of mothers. This research looked at previous studies to pull together the current findings on the experiences of Dad's. It showed that while parenting a child with complex needs can be a positive experience for fathers it can also involve a journey through loss and grief before eventual acceptance of their child's condition. Recommendations include more father-focused interventions and male only support groups.

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12. APPM Formulary - 2024 6th edition

For those that prescribe in paediatric palliative care, the APPM Formulary is essential. The new 6th edition has been substantially revised and extended in length with more background to the drugs and why they're being used. Added content includes conversion tables between routes of opioids, an increased section on midazolam dosing, guidance on the administration of buccal medication and switching medication from gabapentinoids and benzodiazepines.
