

Priority will be given to those on the lowest incomes with the greatest need. Maximum grant value: £2500.

- Decision on grant application is normally made within 3 months of receipt of application.
- Applicants can apply once within a 12 month period
- Trustees meet four times a year, meeting dates are not published however procedures exist to give approvals between meeting dates.



Helping little stars shine bright

The Boparan Charitable Trust aims to help children and young people up to the age of 18, throughout the UK, who are disadvantaged either through poverty, disability or lifelimiting conditions. Maximum grant award of £1500 for Trikes and £1000 for Sensory Items.

Caudwell Children provide a maximum of 70% of the funds required for equipment under £5,000 and a maximum of 80% of the funds required for equipment over £5,000.

The Family Fund help families across the UK who are raising a disabled or seriously ill child or young person aged 17 or under. Families can apply every 12 months, and professionals can submit urgent referrals for children in hospital.

How to apply:

- Application form to be completed by family and posted to the Family Fund.
- For Urgent applications a professional intermediary will need to pre-notify the Family Fund, then email or fax the application to them.

- First time applications by families can take up to 3-4 months to process
- 8-10 weeks average wait for non-first time applications by families
- Urgent referrals from professional intermediaries are usually addressed within 24-48 hours



The Florence Nightingale Aid in Sickness Trust provides life enhancing grants to help people of all ages in need who are ill, convalescent or disabled. These grants are used to provide medical and household aids to alleviate sickness and make a huge difference to people's ability to manage at home and live independently.

Timescales:

- Smaller grants, such as those for respite/convalescence and white goods are reviewed daily. Larger item requests are reviewed at bi-monthly meetings.

The League of the Helping Hand helps those who are living on a very low income, receiving the appropriate welfare benefits and who have exhausted all other funding sources. They provide help to people with physical and diagnosed mental health conditions, learning disabilities and people caring for an adult or child with a disability.

- Submit information via email to Lifeline4Kids about the child, their diagnosis and your request to register interest in a grant. Life4Kids will then send the application form to you, the application requires back-up information from health professionals.

- Meetings to review applications are held on a monthly basis.
- Emergency and welfare appeals are dealt with immediately and decisions can be made within days if vital.



Newlife provides funding for essential community equipment, aiming to improve child health, reduce risk of significant injury and pain, as well as support delivery of care – while enabling childhood experiences and encouraging independence. Newlife also provide free loans of equipment, sensory toy packs and comfort capsules.

How to apply:

- Application form is available on Newlife website. Families can apply but support from a professional is required.

- All grant applications are assessed on an individual basis; if there is an urgent need these can be processed very quickly, however some items can take up to 6-9 months to fund.
- Emergency equipment loan requests are reviewed on the same day; if NewLife are able to help, they aim to deliver equipment within 72 hours.
- Sensory Toy Pod loans have varying timescales depending on the pod requested some pods have a waiting list of a few months.
- There is currently no waiting list for Comfort Capsule loans, however these have been recently launched, and there may be a waiting list when an application is submitted.



Promise Dreams is a national charity which aims to make a difference to children who are seriously or terminally ill by making their dreams come true.

How to apply:

- Application form available on website. Application requires two supporting letters (the first from the child's GP or consultant), the second from anyone else in a supporting capacity with a title of authority. In most cases 3 quotes are required, however for medical/mobility equipment where this may be more difficult to acquire, and a quote accompanied by a description of the item and details of the supplier (e.g., from a catalogue) can be accepted in lieu of 3 quotes.

Timescales:

- Applications are assessed on a monthly basis at Trustee Committee meetings, usually at the end of each calendar month.



Rapid Effective Assistance for Children with potentially Terminal illness

Rapid Effective Assistance for Children with potentially Terminal Illness (REACT) works to improve the quality of life for children with life-limiting illnesses living in financially disadvantaged households throughout the UK.

Roald Dahl's Marvellous Children's Charity provide grants to families facing financial hardship while caring for a child with a serious illness.

How to apply:

- A registered intermediary (health or social care professional) must complete the application. Grants paid will be sent to the intermediaries' organisations bank account and handled by the intermediary.

Timescales:

- Applications are considered at a monthly grants allocations meeting. The application forms need to be submitted by a set date to be considered at each month's meeting. These dates can be found on the charity's website. Depending on when the application is submitted, a decision would be made between 4-8 weeks of receipt of application.



Sullivan's Heroes offers fundraising support specifically for home adaptations to meet children's health and care requirements where the costs of adaptations are in excess of council grants available. Sullivan's heroes provide financial grants and a fundraising platform for families where the family receive 100% of the original donations, where Gift Aid is applicable – no fees will be deducted.

How to apply:

- Complete application form available on website, accompany with notification of approval of a DFG, supporting letter from child's Occupational Therapist and quotes from at least 2 builders showing the full costs and specification of the home adaptations project.
- If approval has not yet been awarded for a DFG you can begin fundraising by applying through sending a letter from your child's Occupational Therapist.

Timescales:

- Applications for grants are usually decided upon within 7-10 working days.



Variety aim to support children who have to cope with sickness, disability or disadvantage. They fund hospitals and hospital units, youth clubs, and support services through their Sunshine Coaches scheme. Variety also fund wheelchairs, equipment grants and days out.

How to apply:

- Separate application processes for wheelchairs, days out and equipment.
- *Wheelchairs:* Application available on website, written agreement from an appropriately qualified professional needs to be submitted in support of the application, alongside the supplier of the equipment's quotation.
- *Days out:* Schools and community groups that work with children who are sick, disabled or disadvantaged are to contact Variety for further information.
- *Equipment:* Application available on website, written agreement from an appropriately qualified professional needs to be submitted in support of the application, alongside the supplier of the equipment's quotation

Timescales:

- Applications for wheelchairs and equipment are reviewed at committee meetings 6 times a year (every two months). From grant approval it can take up to 4-6 months to raise funds for equipment or wheelchairs.



WellChild believe that every child, young person and family must have the opportunity to be cared for at home whenever and have access to high quality, appropriate care and services whatever their needs. WellChild also offer garden and bedroom makeovers through the WellChild Helping Hands home improvement programme.

How to apply:

- Application form available on website.
- A professional involved with the child (not a GP) will need to complete a supporting section of the application form confirming the child's diagnosis and the benefits the project will have on the child.
- Decisions about projects are made without visits to the property, so a clear photograph of the garden or the child's bedroom

- WellChild cannot guarantee how long it will take from them agreeing to take on a project until it's completed as WellChild rely on Company volunteers finding them and arranging the project can take time.
- WellChild aim to complete garden and bedroom makeovers in 1-2 days.
