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

# 5. Article: The risks, benefits, and resource implications of different diets in gastrostomy-fed children: The YourTube mixed method study

For those interested in supporting families and parents to provide home blended food, more evidence to support this. 180 children were followed over 18 months. The findings showed home-blended diets for children who are gastrostomy fed should be seen as a safe alternative to formula feeding for children unless there is a clinical contraindication.

#### 6. Article: What to do to achieve your participatory CPD hours

A good summary of the different ways nurses can fulfil the 20 hours of participatory CPD required for NMC revalidation. It notes:

It can include workshops, conferences or courses, alongside other less obvious activities such as coaching, mentoring, practice visits, social media activity or participation in audits or reviews.'

#### 8. Coproduction of healthcare services: what is it all about?

From the *Nursing Times*, an article providing a good overview of coproduction, what it is, and why every healthcare organisation should have it embedded into service provision and development. It notes the complexities for the NHS but suggests nurses, can play a key part in coproduction, as it builds on patient centred care and communication.

'Coproduction acknowledges that people with a lived experience of a particular condition are often best placed to advise on what support and services will make a positive difference to their lives.'

It provides a list of activities to start the process.

# 9. Exploring what motivates parents of children living with medical complexity to participate in research

It's increasingly being recognised that patients need to be at the heart of any research initiatives, and this Canadian research provides a good example. A parent partner in the research group, who also has a child with medical complexity, interviewed 12 parents (11 mothers and 1 father) of children living with medical complexity to understand their motivations to participate in healthcare research for their child. The parent partner conducted and transcribed the interviews and led the data analysis. Four key themes were identified as well as issues that affected their participation.

# 10. A tool to estimate nurse management hours for commissioners of children's continuing care packages

For hospices that provide commissioned NHS care, this might be a useful tool. It describes the development of a tool to quantify the amount of 'nurse management' time involved when providing commission care packages to children with complex needs. Areas noted include risk assessment, provision of training, nursing assessment and care escalation plans, managing equipment, attendance at MDT's, as well as referrals, and ongoing psychological support to families.
